

Acadia University

Acadia University ranks among Canada's best, recognized for teaching and academic excellence through a personalized educational experience.

Acadia University has a long tradition of research in coastal

environments, which support some of the most important and threatened habitats in the world.

Just in the recent decade, three
Tier II Canada Research Chairs
(O'Driscoll, Stokesbury, Mallory)
as well as the Acadia Centre for
Estuarine Research, the Centre
for Analytical Research on the
Environment, and numerous other
Acadia researchers have focused on
coastal science.


Dr. Mark Mallory was a Tier II Chair at Acadia, and this advancement will see his lab undertake an increased focus on Atlantic Canada (in addition to existing work in the Arctic), as well as more policy and social aspects of coastal science.

Prior to coming to Acadia, Dr.
Mallory was a biologist with
Environment Canada for 20 years,
working on environmental issues

like acid rain, climate change,
Arctic seabird populations, and
environmental contamination. He
has expanded this work since joining
academia in 2011, supporting over
40 students and working from
Ellesmere Island to Portugal to
Florida and many points in between.

In 2014, he was inducted into the Royal Society of Canada, College of New Scholars, Artists and Scientists (2014), and in 2018 he was awarded a Fulbright Chair at the University of Washington during his first sabbatical. He collaborates extensively within the university, as well as nationally and internationally, and this broad engagement has provided new opportunities for his students, and collectively has allowed him and the lab to publish 270 peer-reviewed papers.

Acadia is committed to continuing research on coastal environments, and Dr. Mallory's new Tier 1 CRC will serve as a hub for this research in the years to come.

Cape Breton University

Beijing Normal University - Zhuhai (BNUZ)

Students have the ability to partake in research projects with faculty in the SSOB and Science and Technology schools, as well as innovative research through partnerships in the Verschuren Centre for Sustainability and Energy in the Environment.

Henan Agricultural University (Zhengzhou City)


Beginning in 2007 with a 2+2 in Business and expanding from there, CBU has welcomed many HAU students who transferred into CBU's Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA), Bachelor of Hospitality and Tourism Management (BHTM) programs under the current articulation agreement, some transfer into the Bachelor of Engineering Technology program and some have been admitted into the Master of Business Administration-Community Economic Development program.

Shenzhen Polytechnic

CBU has an ongoing faculty exchange and a research collaboration agreement with Shenzhen Polytechnic. Shenzhen Polytechnic is a Higher educational institute (College) located in Xili, Nanshan District, Shenzhen, Guangdong, China. It was founded in 1993 by the government of Shenzhen, the most developed city in China at that time.

Each of our partnerships strengthen our relationship with China and our dedication to the internationalization and recognition of our university.

Dalhousie University

With campuses in the heart of Halifax and Truro, Nova Scotia, Dalhousie University is one of Canada's leading research-intensive universities.

As one of the most prestigious research universities in Canada, Dalhousie University takes pride in its world-class research, especially in the field of ocean studies. Located in a coastal province, the school hosts Canada's largest university aquatic research facility—the Aquatron—and some of the best ocean researchers in

the country. Similarly, Shandong University also enjoys the advantages of being in a coastal province and has a keen interest in marine science and technology.

The two top-level universities decided to join forces and build a joint lab to advance their marine research and education. In 2018, the two universities launched an agreement called LORE (Laboratory for Ocean Research and Education), signifying the formalized collaboration between the two parties and, according to Dalhousie Aquatron Manager John Batt, it is a collaboration much needed to achieve the goal as marine research is not only a world-wide issue but an extremely complex one.

"For instance, some people have the tanks; some people have the resources to use the tanks, but no one group in the world has all the tools we need to explore the problems. So by working together we have the opportunity to do more good science," Batt said.

The LORE agreement stipulates that the two universities would utilize the MEC (Marine Environmental Chamber System) at Shandong University and the Aquatron Laboratory at Dalhousie. It also

gives researchers from Shandong University access to the Aquatron at Dalhousie University which will help them to understand how this kind of facility operates before they design and eventually build one in China as well.

The partnership has opened the door for exciting exchanges and joint

research projects according to Dr. Chris Moore, Dean of Science, who has travelled to Shandong province many times. Moore said he's very "fond of Shandong province".

"I love the people there they are incredibly friendly—just like Nova Scotians."

Mount Saint Vincent University

Mount Saint Vincent University gives students the best personalized learning experience and opportunity to conduct world-class research.

hen you think about the advantages of a western educational system, in addition to the many world-leading research projects, one of the first things that we think of is the practical, creative methodology that many professors adopt in their teaching. The project led by Assistant Professor at Mount Saint Vincent University, Shane Theunissen is a testament to that argument.

"The best way to teach is often applying it in a real-life setting," said Theunissen. "Because those are the things that the students are going to be able to remember. Marginalized youth don't have access to the resources the majority of the population have. And they don't see themselves contributing to the society in valuable ways. The boat building



program wasn't just about building a boat. It became about building confidence."

Theunissen started the program a year ago collaborating with a local museum in Nova Scotia. The program brings the museum, marginalized youth, and students from the Department of Child and Youth Studies at MSVU together to build a 12-foot-long wooden row boat. It aims to help marginalized youth build their confidence and give the students at MSVU the opportunity to learn how to provide a safe and diverse environment for youth.

Theunissen argues that the best way to help youth that are marginalized in the long term is to teach them skills that would allow them to contribute to society and to find that cultural identity themselves. "If you give someone a fish, I feed you for one day; but if I teach you how to fish, I feed you forever."

NSCAD University

NSCAD University is Canada's premiere university dedicated to advancing the visual arts.

NSCAD graduate Jenny (Yujia) Shi has a stellar resume that any young and ambitious artist would dream of having. She holds two bachelor's degrees from NSCAD University, one in art history and another in fine art, and works

as an art instructor/facilitator at numerous art studios, including one working with adults who have Down syndrome. She has held five solo exhibitions and was also featured in multiple group exhibitions.

"There's a really strong community of professional artists that work very hard at what they do and I just felt like I wanted to stay in Nova Scotia and be a part of that energy."

Even for an accomplished artist like Shi, there have been moments of uncertainty. During those challenging times, her mentor Charley Young — also NSCAD alumna — has always been a champion for her. It was Shi and Young's shared experience that fostered their bond as local artists in Nova Scotia.

"I remember sending Charley a message saying I feel really stressed, I'm not sure what to do. And she is always very positive, always gives me what I really need to hear, at the right moment."

Shi said she felt quite uncertain about her first application for a bigbudget public art project in Cape Breton. She wasn't sure what to talk about in the application or what work to present, all of which was brand-new for a young artist like her.

Although the two of them had known each other since 2013,

Shi and Young started working closely ten months ago through a mentorship program under Visual Arts Nova Scotia, a local artist-run organization that strives to advocate for the visual arts industry in the province.

The ten-month program pairs established and emerging artists at the beginning of their artistic career. During the ten months, the mentee will meet regularly with the mentor and join group meetings with all mentors and mentees in the program.


The program is a way for Visual Arts Nova Scotia to help build a sustainable, vibrant art community. It is this sense of community that brought Young, originally from Calgary, Alberta all the way to Nova Scotia.

"I was 20 when I moved out here. I loved being in Nova Scotia, and I have a great community," said Young.

Young came to Halifax as an exchange student to NSCAD in 2008 and decided to make Nova Scotia her second home.

"I think one of the things about NSCAD, and the greater arts community in Halifax, is that there's a lot of support and encouragement," said Young. "There's a really strong community of professional artists that work very hard at what they do and I just felt like I wanted to stay in Nova Scotia and be a part of that energy."

Both Shi and Young are confident that the mentorship program is only a beginning of a fruitful life-long friendship between them, with more exciting collaborations yet to come.

Saint Mary's University


Saint Mary's University offers a truly international experience with 30% of students coming from outside Canada to study in all the institutions academic disciplines.

Founded over two decades ago, the Saint Mary's University Entrepreneurship Centre (SMUEC) is a leading provider of university-

based business support services in Atlantic Canada. It is the hub of numerous student-based and employer-focused programs. These programs offer unique experiential learning opportunities for students, including job placements and idea acceleration.

"Our programs are extremely diverse with two specifically focused on providing international students

with the skills, resources, and connections necessary to progress their careers and business ideas," said Michael Sanderson, Director of the Saint Mary's University Entrepreneurship Centre, "We ensure every student at Saint Mary's is exposed to entrepreneurship in some capacity, prior to graduating."

Over the past 25 years, the SMUEC has helped thousands of students, both nationally and internationally. Mubdu Alali is one of the international student-entrepreneurs at Saint Mary's who says he couldn't have started his business, Bloxo, a sports game matching app, without the help of the Centre.

"I think when you are young, you think of a dream but you don't really study it well because you don't know the market." Alali said. Before Bloxo came to mind, Alali says he thought of many "bad ideas", and it was the experienced professionals at the SMUEC that helped him to land on the right one.

Mubdu Alali is in his second year at Saint Mary's University pursuing a Bachelor of Commerce from the Sobey School of Business.

The business program is ranked among the best in the country. More importantly, it's also a champion in creating a diverse community.

"Within the business school, over 46% of the students are international and they come from

83 countries", said Dr. Harjeet Bhabra, Dean of the Sobey School of Business.

In addition to offering insightful business advice to students, the Centre is also the hub for student organizations focusing on social entrepreneurship. Enactus is the largest student leadership organization worldwide, focused on using entrepreneurial action as a way to create positive change in the community.

Enactus Saint Mary's Co-President, Bethany Ripoll, feels inspired by being part of a diverse team of students all focused on addressing local challenges. "It's incredible how much Enactus helps students develop their professional skills and gain real-world experience," Ripoll said.

St. Francis Xavier University

St. Francis Xavier University (St.FX) combines the three things students want: an outstanding reputation, high-quality learning, and an extraordinary residential community.

Getting real-world research exposure is a great resume booster for a Computer Science undergrad, according to Dr. Jacob Levman, St.FX's new Canada Research Chair.

"The students who have come to work with me and have done something related to machine learning, the ones

who have graduated, they all have jobs. They are doing great," Dr. Levman said there's a great demand for machine learning programmers, and the hands-on experience provided by his research lab helps to make students stand out.

Dr. Levman's academic excellence spans from technical engineering to medical data analysis. He completed his postdoctoral research fellowship with Harvard Medical School and still

has an ongoing appointment with the school as a research associate. He also received training in neuroimaging at the University of Oxford's Institute of Biomedical Engineering after finishing postdoctoral training in medical physics at Sunnybrook Health Sciences Center. He completed his PhD in medical biophysics at the University of Toronto. Dr. Levman

also has extensive technical industry experience including working in Silicon Valley in California.

Dr. Levman said the practicality St.FX emphasizes as well as their world-class research quality is a good fit for his academic background. "St. FX's overall research is extremely high from what I've seen," Dr. Levman said. In the newest Maclean's

ranking, the Computer Science department at St.FX ties for the 1st in the country with the University of Toronto before University of Waterloo in terms of average citations.

Fenggang Zhou sounds older than he really is on the phone. The 24-year-old recent graduate landed an opportunity as the International Education Program Officer Intern at Acadia University; the same university Zhou graduated from in May 2018. Zhou came to Wolfville, Nova Scotia to complete his degree in Environmental Science in 2014. A month after his graduation, Zhou received a job offer from Acadia University. As an international graduate who had never worked full-time in Canada before, the job offer is a testament to Zhou's excellence.

The major Zhou chose to study, Environmental Science, is quite challenging for international students, according to Zhou. Zhou said that because it's difficult for international students to graduate from the program, not many students would choose this major.

"I'm one of those people who are drawn to challenges—the more difficult people think it is, the more I want to give it a try," Zhou said.

Before coming to Nova Scotia, Zhou studied at UESTC, Zhongshan Institute in China. Zhou said he decided to study abroad when he was in middle school. "I've always wanted to go abroad. I want to see the outside world. If I keep staying in the same place, doing the same thing, I'd feel pretty bored."

Zhou said the first time he hopped on a plane to Canada he felt as if he had been in a movie. "I can still remember what the houses looked like as the plane was flying through the clouds. Everything was new to me. I even wondered what the grocery stores would look like."

Zhou said his dream is to go to medical school and become a doctor. In order to achieve this goal, he has been volunteering in an emergency room at a local hospital in Wolfville since he was a student at Acadia University.

"You have to really get your hands dirty before you know whether you actually like something or not."

Zhou said after being a volunteer at the hospital, he realized that he tends to thrive in a high-pressure environment, and he enjoys the feeling of being able to help others.

u Jing, a graduate from Cape Breton University (CBU), said she decided to study abroad when she was studying at another university in China. Yu had already spent a year at a university in China before she came to Canada. Yu said after spending some time in that university in China, she had made up her mind to experience a different education style.

Since Yu came to Cape Breton University in 2014, she has stayed on top of her class through her education. Yu kept herself busy with many part-time jobs, including working at the Student Center and for the university as a teaching assistant. All those working experiences paved her way of landing on a job at an accountant firm in Nova Scotia after graduation, and her relationship with Cape Breton University became stronger.


"After the graduation, I would sometimes bump into my professors and we would still have long chats on the street with each other," Yu said.

Yu thinks that the small-size classrooms at Cape Breton University are the reason that she was able to establish a close relationship with her professors.

"Our class had 50 students at one point and that's the most people we had had. We interacted a lot with the teachers. They were always ready to help and they really wanted to know you as a person. You are not just one of many—you matter to them," Yu said.

Yu is currently the board member of two local not-for-profit organizations and is considering about starting her own business.





The Bachelor of Public Relations is one of the most nationally respected degrees at Mount Saint Vincent University (MSVU). Every year its graduates land jobs at reputable companies across the country. The program's high academic standard also makes it quite challenging for students to complete this well-know program. Lingyang Wang is one of the international students in the program.

"I like programs that are more engaging. I want to actually do something rather than just writing papers all day," Wang said.

All the students enrolled in the Bachelor of Public Relations program are required to complete a co-operative education component consisting of three work terms built into their study. Wang can take his knowledge to the real world with hands-on experience. By the time he graduates, he will have a full year of work experience. This working experience can be essential for an international student like him who wants to stay and work in Canada after he graduates.

Wang came to Halifax in 2014 right after he graduated from Beijing No.25 High School. Because of the collaboration between Wang's high school and Nova Scotia, he had the chance to meet Ashley-Jane Chow, the International Business Development Consultant at MSVU, from whom he heard about the small-size classrooms the university has to offer.

"I knew I would be facing people from all parts of the world if I go abroad and I didn't think I would do really well if I'm in a big university environment. So I chose MSVU, which is a lot smaller." Wang said.

Wang is graduating in the fall of 2019 and he said he plans to stay in Halifax afterward.

"I've seen a lot of changes since I came here. I think, as the biggest city in the east coast, Halifax has a bright future ahead and I believe it's a good decision to stay."





Jiani Wen showed a good taste in fashion when I first met her. Unsurprisingly, this young 26-year-old lady from Hunan province is a professional designer. Wen came to Halifax four years ago to complete a Master's Degree in Interdisciplinary Design at NSCAD University, a unique program at NSCAD with a focus on interdisciplinary study that sets itself apart from other art schools in Canada.

Wen said all her classmates come from a different kind of visual art background; some of them studied interior or graphic design, while others did something more science-based such as software or industrial design.

"We had a lot of group projects covering various disciplines. You could then learn things that are completely different from what you originally studied," Wen said.

Wen completed her Bachelor degree in China before coming to Halifax. Having studied in both countries, Wen has a deep understanding of the different methodologies the two systems adopt. Wen said the universities in China use a result-oriented method, whereas the ones in Canada focus more on the process. She said the students in China are usually asked to present a complete design plan and follow it through and Canadian students could end up with a design that's completely the opposite to the original idea after some intensive research.

"As a student, I think when I focus on the process rather than the result, I could learn more because I don't have to worry. I could let my imagination go wild and keep refining the project," Wen said.

After completing two rounds of interviews and numerous design projects, Wen graduated in April in 2018 from NSCAD, and now she works as a graphic designer at a Halifax-based company named Dormie Workshop and J Design.

"Everyone is so friendly here. They really care."

e Man was born and raised in Beijing and came to Halifax two years ago in 2016 after she finished the international high school curriculum in the capital city. Now she's a second-year student at Saint Mary's University and she said she's enjoying her life here in Halifax.

"I like the weather here—it's not as hot as in Beijing. Also, it's peaceful here; and not as crowded as Beijing so I have the time and energy to do things I like," Man said.

The high school curriculum that Man completed in Beijing was the same high school curriculum that students complete in Nova Scotia, according to Man.

"Our teachers were Canadian teachers and we had a variety of cool subjects that are not provided in a traditional Chinese high school. We even had a drama course where we performed a Shakespeare play."

Man said the experience helped her to better adjust herself as an international student at Saint Mary's University.

"At least I know what a group project is. I know what deadlines mean. I know in a traditional high school setting; you don't get to do any of those—you have exams and that's pretty much all."

Although Man is doing well as an international student now, when she first came to Halifax, she felt quite homesick.

"I still remember when I first came here, I really missed my mom. Luckily, I lived in the residence on campus where we had a lot of floor events with other students. And after living there for a while, I didn't feel like missing home."

t's always easy to spot an alumnus from St. Francis Xavier University (St.FX) on the street because almost all of them wear the same 'X' ring.

"Since I graduated from St.FX, whenever I saw people with an X ring, I always immediately feel close to them. I have a lot of friends who graduated long before I did, but we became friends with each other right after we recognized the ring," Liu said.

Every student at St.FX can, and most of them will, purchase the ring at the time of their graduation. The letter 'X' on the outside stands for the university's name, and the inside of the ring is engraved with the student's initials, making the seemingly identical rings unique to each graduate.

St.FX is located in the small town of Antigonish, Nova Scotia. The university has small classes.

According to the university's website, each class has about 34 students on average.

Liu said because there is a small population on campus, she was able to get to know people from different departments and received a lot of help from the university as an international student.

"I remember one of my friends had a family emergency and needed to go home on Christmas Eve and there was no bus to take her to the airport that day. One of the staff offered to help take my friend to the airport that night," Liu said, "I think in a culture where people value quality time with families during Christmas time, her offer was extremely generous."

Or you can go up to the Eastern Shore if you are interested in surfing or kayaking—it's a great spot for water activities. There are countless things to see and do in this charming province.


"You tell me what you like, we



EduNova had the chance to ask NSBI some key questions regarding our ties with China and its economical impact.

Q: NSBI has been helping local companies to grow internationally. What's new about how you work with companies?

A: We've taken a proactive approach to economic development when it comes to trade diversification. Over the past few years, we've focused on identifying new markets of opportunity for our companies, and have been working with them to explore and enter new

markets, including China. Our staff travel to China several times a year and support companies in attending trade missions there.

Q. Attracting investment has been one of the key missions for NSBI. In your opinion, what do we as a coastal province have to offer to investors compared to the bigger cities such as Toronto?

A: Nova Scotia has a very vibrant Oceans Economy that is leading Canada and has the highest concentrations of researchers including the Bedford Institute of Oceanography and research institutes in NS universities & college campuses. There is availability of loyal skilled labour, and the provincial government very supportive of its development via incentives and policy support.

Q: How would that then contribute to the people

who actually study, work and live in Nova Scotia?

A: Our private sector works closely with our partners at post-secondary institutions, which brings many opportunities to our students. Our universities and colleges are an integral part of our business ecosystem and are a hub for research and development, allowing students to connect with industry and gain valuable experience.

Nova Scotia launched the Nova Scotia-China Engagement Strategy in 2016 to develop our relationship with China. NSBI has been very active in the implementation of the plan.

Q: What is the newest progress so far?

A: Our exports to China jumped from \$420 million in 2015 to \$793 million in 2018. There have been investments made by a Shanghai-based real estate company and a couple of large Chinese seafood companies into the province.

Q: Where do you see Nova Scotia in the next five years?

A: The Canadian government has a strategic goal for diversification in trade, and Nova Scotia has been working hard to achieve that. At Nova Scotia Business Inc., we're focused on a future for Nova Scotia that is connected to the world through trade and investment, strong international partnerships, and increased immigration.

Interview with Promising Education Ltd.

in major cities in China. The company
provides services for university
application and supports students
while they are studying abroad.

We had the pleasure to talk to Vincent Zhang, the President, as well as Judy Liu, the Marketing Manager, about their perspectives on international education. The following paragraphs are adapted from the transcript.

Q: Judy, how long have you been working in international education?

A: I have been working in the industry since 2004. So, 14 years.

Q: Why did you want to get into the industry?

A: Well, because I benefited from the North American educational system, I've studied abroad, and I know how to choose how to study. I really want to help them (students) to make the right decisions.

Q: In your own experience, what are the differences between the Chinese vs. Canadian educational system?

A: A typical model in a Chinese educational system is the teacher being the instructor and the students being the follower, finishing the tasks given to them. They are not asked to put what they've learned into practice, whereas most business programs in Canada are project-based.

Q: Vincent, what do you think has changed over the years among international students?

A: (international) students think differently when they choose their major now. The majority of them used to choose engineering majors because they believed it would be easier to find a job. That's how people thought ten years ago. Now, more and more students would rather pick business degrees instead. It's almost a 50/50 split between those two majors. This means Chinese families are better-off and are able to support their children to study something that they actually like—finding a job is not the only concern anymore.

Q: What differentiates international high schools from schools that offer IELTS or A-level courses?

A: It is an all-rounded experience. International high schools offer students a whole English-immersed educational experience—they learn everything English. This would help them in the long round in the future.
